About the workshop Instead of approaching art history as just a series of key dates and names to remember, this workshop aims towards building an understanding of the progression of styles in Indian art. Beginning with Indian art at the turn of the 20th century and ending with a broad overview of Indian art in the contemporary times and possible future directions, the workshop will trace the evolution of Indian art's major periods and styles by a close consideration of works by some of the renowned artists, while mapping its course on the political history of the country, as well within the global art scenario. Participants will emerge with a greater understanding of the arc of Indian art, an in-depth understanding of some of the greatest works by Indian artists, and a critical eye for contemporary art.

The weekly lectures will be interactive in nature with group discussions, and small exercises. Presentations and Q&A sessions with invited artists will be arranged. Comprehensive glossary of terms used and a complete reading list for each session will be provided, along with a bookstall from where art books may be purchased at discounted prices. The workshop will end with a specially curated walkthrough at a museum.

About the facilitator Priya Pall is an independent art consultant. She has recently founded Artinsights, in response to the Indian artistic and cultural sector's need for bespoke advice and support. Priya has provided curatorial direction to the newly set up Heritage Transport Museum (Manesar, Gurgaon). She has worked with Amity Education Group to set up Amity Art Foundation; she provides ongoing advisory service to art collectors, both Indian and international, and has curated significant personal collections. In 2013-14, she was engaged by the Inlaks Shivdasani Foundation as the executive director for INSERT2014.

Priya has been working in the field of art and culture since 1996, with a focus on contemporary Indian art since 2006. She has held senior positions in public and private art organizations around the country. She was the Projects Curator for India Art Fair in 2009. She has worked with the Embassy of France in India, as cultural officer and was also responsible for setting up the art, literature & children's section at the French Information Resource Centre.

In 2011, Priya was awarded the Art Think South Asia (ATSA) Fellowship by the Goethe Institut, through which she received training at the Registrar's department at Haus der Kunst in Munich.

Priya has a Masters in Museum Studies from the National Museum Institute, New Delhi, with an additional qualification in history of art from the Sotheby's Institute, London. She holds a degree in English Literature from Lady Sri Ram College, University of Delhi, and an advanced diploma in French from Alliance francaise, New Delhi.

Currently living in New Delhi, Priya has lived in Hong Kong with her family for over 20 years, where she received her high school education. Having later on moved to Los Angeles and London, Priya is a global citizen and maintains an expansive understanding of contemporary art and culture, both Indian and international.

Sanjula's travel pieces feature places and issues of interest in Egypt, Kuwait and Boston. While in Kuwait, where she resided for two years, she freelanced for the country's leading daily, *The Arab Times* and also for magazines like *Kuwait this Month* and *The Times*. She was an active member of the **Kuwait Writers Workshop**, an international literary group in the country.

The author has been working as consultant editor for **AIMA** (All India Management Association), Delhi for the past seven years. She has composed articles, edited and designed for their in-house magazine, *AIMA News*, which enjoys a nationwide circulation in the management arena. She has

recently edited a book on small and medium scale industries for the organization and also written monographs for its flagship events.

Sanjula enjoyed a brief stint in TV journalism when she worked as script writer and program controller for popular programs like **Khoobsurat**, **Maansi and El Look** in 1996. She plans to make a comeback to the visual media, beginning with a conversion of some of her short stories into film scripts.

Sanjula works as a volunteer at **Tamana**, a school for children with special needs. She focuses on drama and music therapy and also believes in involving mainstream children in some of the school activities. She is a member of the **I.W.P.C.** (Indian Women's Press Corps) and also of the **Poetry Society of India**. Along with some fellow writers, she conducts an interactive **Writer's Workshop** every month for aspiring as well as established poets and authors.

Sanjula's passion is creative writing which translates into poems and short stories. Her first collection of poetry, *Poems* was published in 1992. *The Cameo Sheaves*, a collection of short tories has an Indian urban backdrop but deals with themes that interest a global readership. *To Be Mortal*, her second collection of poems, was released in November, 2009 at the India International Centre, Delhi. Some of her poems from this collection have been made into video clips. Her recent poetic work, *The Temple*, which focuses on the metaphysical, was launched as an E-book in March 2011.

Ashish has led ANANT team to do innovative school and community projects.

The work of Ashish and ANANT have traveled to participate in festivals, exchange programmes and international meets in Seoul, Kuala Laumpur, Ottawa, Toronto, Washington, Copenhagen, Malmoe, Colombo, Montreal and Hamburg. The team is active in ASSITEJ India, a national and international network connecting thousands of theatre persons and groups working in Theatre for Young Audience (TYA). Ashish was the Convener of the First National Conference on TYA in 2011, held at New Delhi.
